

Spotlight on E-Journals

What is BC University Libraries E-Journals?

BC University Libraries E-Journals database is an index of the 23,700 electronic journals accessible by BC students, faculty and staff. It includes open access journals (those available to the public without subscription) as well as those available through BC subscription. The index can be searched by journal title, journal title keyword, ISSN or vendor. The index is browsable by journal title and by journal subject. The index entry for a journal links to the databases containing the journal. Clicking on the journal title in the index entry opens a window for retrieving an article by citation in the database or website of your choice.



Where do I find it?

You can get to E-Journals from the BC Law Library homepage. The “Electronic Journals” link in the left vertical bar will take you right to it. There is also an “E-Journals” link under Resources on the BC University Libraries homepage. The E-Journals database is located at http://metaquest.bc.edu:4000/sfx_local/az.

So, how do I use it?

To quickly find 81 REVIEW OF ECONOMICS AND STATISTICS 91 (1999), click on the “electronic journals” link on the law library homepage. Type “review of economics and statistics” in the title search screen and click “go”. This takes you to the entry for the Review of Economics and Statistics which tells you that the journal is available full-text on seven different BC subscription databases and publicly-accessible websites. The availability date ranges tell you that, of those seven sources, only EBSCOHOST, JSTOR and MIT Press have the article you need. You decide to use JSTOR in order to get a high-quality pdf of the article. To retrieve the article, simply click on the JSTOR link and use the volume and page numbers to find and download the article.

How do I find electronic journals which aren't in the E-Journals database?

The E-Journals database is a comprehensive list of BC subscription-access electronic journals. The E-Journals database also lists many, but not all, open access scholarly journals. If you can't find the journal you need on E-Journals, check the Internet. There are two excellent portals to non-subscription academic journals: the Directory of Open Access Journals (nearly 3000 journals; including 127 legal periodicals) at www.doaj.org and Open J-Gate (over 4200 journals) at www.openj-gate.org. Finally, if you need an article from an electronic journal which is neither open access nor within BC's subscriptions, don't despair. Keep in mind that you may be able to use the law library's inter-library loan (ILL) services to obtain the article from a library that does subscribe to the journal.
